2025 Annual Budget

The Town of White City's 2025 Annual Budget was officially adopted by Council on February 3, 2025. Residents can explore the full budget presentation and discussion by visiting whitecity.civicweb.net/Portal/.

WHAT IS A MUNICIPAL BUDGET

A municipal budget is a financial plan that outlines the expected revenues and expenditure of a local government over a specific period of time, typically a fiscal year. It details how funds will be allocated to provide public services, infrastructure projects, and operational expenses. Municipal budgets typically cover areas such as governance, recreation, culture, public works, planning, environmental services, protective services and other services essential to the community's well-being. The budgeting process involves assessing needs, setting priorities, and making decisions to ensure the responsible and effective use of public funds.

WHITE CITY'S BUDGET APPROACH

The Town of White City's (the Town) 2025 Annual Budget was prepared using a thoughtful and conservative approach which prioritizes financial stability and minimizing risk by allocating resources. Emphasis is placed on prudence, careful planning, and a focus on long-term financial security rather than pursuing ambitious or high-risk financial strategies.

Assumptions about revenues are typically modest, relying on realistic and proven sources of income. Expenditures are scrutinized and kept in check, with a preference for essential and predictable costs. The budget also focuses on building reserves to address unforeseen challenges or emergencies. This approach aims to ensure financial stability by avoiding over-optimistic projections and maintaining a resilient financial position. In conjunction with this philosophy, the 2025 Annual Budget has been prepared with a focus on maintaining service levels for the municipality and its residents whilst balancing management of infrastructure and assets.

The 2025 Annual Budget outlines investments in recreation, community services, and infrastructure to enhance quality of life for all residents. This year, the Town is developing and enhancing eight major community events, supporting the Youth Advisory Committee to expand youth amenities and programs, and improving parks and recreational facilities, including a washroom at the Splash Park, Kingsmere Pathway restoration, refurbishing the Double K Outdoor Rink, and the development of the Emerald Ridge Sportsfield in collaboration with the R.M. of Edenwold. As well as continued investment in parks, playgrounds, and sports fields to ensure equitable access for all residents.

The Budget also prioritizes mental health resources, expanded public health services and programs, and ongoing support for firefighters to achieve national certifications. As White City grows, the Town is continuing to invest in water and sewer infrastructure, enhancing drainage and landscaping, maintaining green spaces and tree canopy through the Urban Forestry Program, and replacing aging equipment to ensure reliable snow removal, road maintenance, and facility upkeep.

REVENUE (WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM)

Revenue refers to the money that the Town collects or receives to finance operations and services for the community. Property taxes and unconditional revenue are the Town's largest source of income, contributing an anticipated \$4.41 million in 2025. Fees and user charges, primarily from water and sewer service and facility rentals, are expected to generate approximately \$4.44 million or 49% of total revenues, in 2025. The 2025 Budget includes a 1.0% mill rate increase and a \$100 base tax increase. About 85% of residents will see an annual tax increase between approximately \$9.41 and \$10.36 before discounts.

The Town has implemented a full-cost approach to utility rates since 2020. This approach ensures that the utility covers its operating costs while also setting aside reserve for future capital project and emergencies. This method accounts for both the current operational costs of the utility and future asset maintenance. This method also ensures that utility costs are fairly distributed among users rather than being shifted to property taxes, which would require higher-value properties to subsidize lower-value ones. Recognized as a municipal best practice, this approach promotes rate stability, utility self-sufficiency, and eliminates the need for tax-based subsidization.

To balance service delivery with affordability, the 2025 Budget includes adjustments to water and sewer rates and an increase to the Wastewater Infrastructure Charge. Based on historical consumption analysis, these rates will ensure full-cost recovery for both water and sewer services with a \$22.4K surplus, as indicated in the utility rate review completed in 2024. These adjustments will help the Town's Utility Service cover both operating and capital expenses while positioning White City for a sustainable surplus in future years.

For the average consumption of 20 cubic meters per month, residents would see an approximate \$20.00 increase to their monthly bill.


As part of the 2025 budget planning process, in 2024 the Town conducted a utility rate review to continue a sustainable rate strategy that maintains the utility's financial self-sufficiency. Green Finance Consulting Services was contracted to update the Town's utility rate model.

The review recommended increasing the Wastewater Infrastructure Charge from \$33.58 to \$43.00 per month per household. This adjustment reflects a portion of the costs associated with the WCRM158 Wastewater Management Authority's Wastewater Expansion Project. The increased fee will cover 52.2% of the project's debt financing costs in 2025, ensuring wastewater services meet the needs of current residents while the additional financing costs are paid by future growth and development.

Council evaluated the option of subsidizing utility rates with municipal taxes. However, it was determined that if utility rates were subsidized, the lost revenue would need to be recovered through property taxes. Eliminating the Wastewater Infrastructure Fee would require an approximate 28% mill rate increase. While residents would save approximately \$400 annually on utility bills, property taxes could rise between \$370 and \$2,000, with most seeing an increase between \$400 and \$670.

After careful consideration, White City Town Council approved the adjusted 2025 utility rates at the February 3rd Regular Council Meeting as part of the 2025 Budget. This decision reflects Council's commitment to responsible financial management, maintenance of services, and planning for future growth. As members of the community, Council understands and is sensitive to residents' concerns regarding water and sewer rates. At the same time, they recognize their responsibility as elected officials in maintaining the long-term fiscal health of our community assets. It is with these considerations that they make this tough decision.

HOW IS WHITE CITY FUNDED:



EXPENSES (WHAT THE MONEY IS USED FOR)

Expenses refer to the funds the Town uses to provide services, cover costs, and maintain infrastructure. They are the various payments and expenditures that the Town incurs to carry out its day-to-day operations and fulfill its obligations. Municipalities have various expenses to manage. These can include costs for maintaining and operating infrastructure, such as roads and public buildings.

A significant portion of the Town's expenditures are utility services. The Town plans to spend \$2.01 million of total expenses, in 2025, on treated water purchases from SaskWater and long-term debt interest expenses related to utility projects.

Utility services include the purchase of treated water from the White City Water Treatment Plant, owned by SaskWater, and the water and sewer distribution systems, owned by the Town. Expenses associated with the utility service correspond with providing safe drinking water to residents, updating and maintaining our water distribution system and improving sewer pumping capacity. The Town's Utility Service is transitioning to a full-cost recovery basis, meaning the utility is self-sufficient and does not rely on resident tax dollars to operate.

The 1.0% increase to the mill rate and \$100 increase to base tax, plus the increased utility rates will generate higher Town revenues, allowing the Utility to recover operating and capital costs and enabling the Town to function at a surplus in the coming years.


TAX DOLLAR

Have you ever wondered how each tax dollar is spent?

The image below shows the 2025 Annual Budget broken down into different functions in the Town. Each dollar spent is put into essential infrastructure and service needs for the residents and businesses in White City but does not include utility expenditures. This is because the Town uses fund accounting to separate into two distinct business units, general operations and utility services.

General Operations: Relates to the services provided by the Town to the residents. It is funded primarily through property taxes and includes both operating and capital components. The majority of the services provided to the Town are supported by this fund.

Utility Services: Includes water and wastewater services provided to residents. It is a separate fund that operates on a full cost recovery basis and includes both operating and capital components. Utility services are funded through rate charges to residents.



Budget Highlights

GENERAL GOVERNANCE

- Reducing reliance on external contractors by completing more projects in-house with current municipal staff.
- Evaluating existing software to ensure efficient and effective service delivery to residents.
- Strengthening and expanding communications efforts with residents.
- Ongoing support for the Youth Initiative Project, guided by the Youth Advisory Committee, to create and implement a plan for expanding youth amenities in the community.
- Ensuring strong municipal management through the responsible stewardship of financial and other resources, ensuring transparency and accountability.

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

• Creating the Town's new Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaw to guide future growth and bring the community's vision to life.

PARKS, RECREATION & CULTURE

- Ensuring affordable access to sports, recreation, and cultural programs and events.
- Maintaining equitable and affordable access to parks, sports fields, ball diamonds, tennis and pickleball courts, ice surfaces, and community facilities.

- Continued investment in wastewater treatment infrastructure projects to support ongoing community growth and development.

- Regular review of utility rates to ensure utilities remain self-sustaining without relying on municipal tax subsidies.

PUBLIC WORKS

- Upgrading or replacing aging equipment to ensure reliable services for residents, including general operations and winter maintenance.
- Continued repairs and maintenance within the sewer and water infrastructure.
- Advancing the management of the Town's Urban Forest Program.
- Implementing drainage and landscaping enhancements throughout the community, including the evaluation of the Kingsmere Pathway Restoration project and the Double K Outdoor Rink Refurbishment project.
- Development of the Emerald Ridge Sportsfield project in collaboration with the R.M. of Edenwold
- Ensuring the Public Works Team is fully trained in all necessary safety protocols for daily operations.

ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES

- Ongoing delivery of solid waste services, including curbside garbage, recycling, and compost collection.
- Sustaining spring and fall cleanup programs, including bin services, branch chipping, and leaf bag collection.

FIRE SERVICES

- Ongoing training for volunteer members to achieve national certifications, ensuring residents receive the highest level of fire and emergency services.
- Further development and improvement of training facilities.
- Collaborative training with local, regional, and provincial partners.
- Engagement in a national training initiative focused on encouraging women to join firefighting services.



Upcoming Projects & Reminders

With warmer days ahead, it's time to start preparing for spring. As snow clearing continues and we anticipate the spring melt, here are a few important reminders to help keep everything running smoothly.

Garbage & Recycling Bin Placement

This winter's heavy snowfall has made proper bin placement more important than ever. When bins are left on the street, snowplows must work around them, leaving piles of snow that need to be cleared the next day. To keep our streets clear, please place your bins on your property, just behind the road edge, and bring them in once they've been emptied. Leaving bins out for multiple days not only makes snow clearing difficult but also creates hazards for drivers and pedestrians.

Snow Removal & Drainage Prep

Public Works crews will be making their way through town to haul away snow piles from properties, corners, and ditches. This work helps reduce flooding risks as the snow begins to melt. Starting in mid-to-late March, crews will begin clearing drainage ditches, digging out culvert ends, and preparing for spring runoff to ensure water flows properly.

Frozen Culvert Maintenance


As temperatures rise, Public Works will also be steaming frozen culverts throughout town. If you notice pooling water in a ditch or along a road, please submit a request through our service tracker, and we'll take care of it as soon as possible. Please keep in mind that Public Works does not clear or steam U-channels in personal driveways, so we encourage residents to keep their own drainage swales clear to help with spring runoff.
